Families Matter Project

\$3.7 million

This Salem Health Foundation project will provide spaces for respite and reflection with the creation of a new chapel, outdoor garden and family gathering areas.



The Let's All Play Place (2016) gives our community's children a safe, inclusive place that accommodates children of all abilities.

**Opening in 2022** Salem Health's newest building will add 150 beds as well as new walkways and driveways for easier access to the parking garage and the Emergency Department.



### Why is the Families Matter Project important?

These newly designed spaces help anyone waiting in worry or duress.

Low-resource families have diminished transportation resources. For this reason, low-resource families are disproportionately impacted by inadequate waiting space. **The Families Matter Project will help them**.

Seniors in hospital care bring supporters and loved ones. This project adds a chapel and other private spaces for families. **The Families**Matter Project will deliver good places to pause and reflect on important family decisions.

Care providers are confident that the presence of families and supporters speeds healing, and affects the patient experience. The Families Matter Project will improve patient care and lower the stress felt by families and supporters.

### Families Matter Project expands and improves the Salem Health Emergency Department (ER)

This 3.7 million dollar project will improve upon the new Salem Health Tower construction project

Our Emergency Department (ER) is the Northwest's busiest, seeing 115,000 patients in 2019.

Anyone receiving treatment in the ER can take comfort that their families and supporters will have a better experience because of the Families Matter Project. COVID-19 showed how patient/ family separation affected patient care. A flurry of difficult decision await patients, families, and supporters in the ER. This project delivers necessary new spaces for reflection, privacy, and family conversations.



## Highlights of the Families Matter Project

Will improve ER access and visibility. The improvements will more quickly get patients and families to ER care.

Will make the separation of patients from families less stressful. These improvements will be accessible 24 hours a day.

Will add space for families who need to spread out while waiting.

Will add comfortable seating clusters, proximate to the ER receiving areas.

Will create areas useful to families, friends, and supporters who need a place for reflection and respite.

We will create an All Faiths Chapel for all visitors and families to find quiet and useful spaces for prayer and contemplation.







**ALL FAITHS CHAPEL** is uniquely designed to serve families or individuals from all backgrounds who desire comfort, quiet, and introspection.

Intended as a safe place, where spiritual despair and hope can be privately expressed.

**THE REFLECTION GARDEN** offers sheltered, semi-private outdoor spaces for families and individuals wishing to stretch out, or get some fresh air in a safe, enclosed garden and personal reflection area.

These improvements are thoughtfully intended to give 24 hour access, and convenience of location near patient floor elevators and the Emergency Department.

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


The Foundation transforms community support into community action. It assists people in need who are often afraid to ask for help. The Families Matter project benefits everyone, but especially those financially disadvantaged.
